

Two books you may want to

check out from are Church Library are:

Sons of Encouragement by Francine Rivers is a compilation of the five books that share the stories of five Biblical men who stood behind the heroes of the faith and quietly changed eternity. Aaron, the priest who stood in Moses' shadow but had the courage to cover his brother's fears. Caleb, the warrior whose words stirred men's hearts and brought God's people to the Promised Land. Jonathan, the prince whose humility led him to befriend the man who would become king in his place. Amos, the prophet who heard when God called and spoke to a nation unwilling to listen. Silas, the scribe who surrendered his wealth to record God's word, even as those around him were silenced. Each faithfully sought after God in the shadows of His chosen leaders, each answered God's call to serve without recognition or fame, and each gave everything, knowing his reward might not come until the next life.

The Funeral Dress by Susan Gregg Gilmore is the story of a woman, Emmalee Bullard and her new baby who are on their own. Or so she thinks, until Leona Lane, the older seamstress who sat by her side at the local shirt factory where both women worked as collar makers, insists Emmalee come and live with her. Just as Emmalee prepares to escape her hardscrabble life in Red Chert holler, Leona dies tragically. Grief-stricken, Emmalee decides she'll make Leona's burying dress, but there are plenty of people who don't think the unmarried Emmalee should design a dress for a Christian woman - or care for a child on her own. But with every stitch, Emmalee struggles to do what is right for her daughter and to honor Leona the best way she can, finding unlikely support among an indomitable group of seamstresses and the town's funeral director. In a moving tale exploring Southern spirit and camaraderie among working women, a young mother will compel a town to become a community.

<u>Half Broke Horses</u>: A True-Life Novel by Jeannette Walls is the book the Book Club will be reading for the month of May.

Originally conceived as a biography based on family interviews and historical research, Walls found herself filling in too many blanks for Half Broke Horses to remain a work of nonfiction, so she assumed her grandmother's indomitable voice and set out to write a novelistic recreation of grandmother's unconventional life. <u>Half Broke Horses</u> tells the heartwarming story of an irrepressible woman who carved her own destiny.

So begins the story of Lily Casey Smith, Jeannette Walls's no-nonsense, resourceful, and spectacularly compelling grandmother. By age six, Lily was helping her father break horses. At fifteen, she left home to teach in a frontier town—riding five hundred miles on her pony, alone, to get to her job. She learned to drive a car and fly a plane. And, with her husband, Jim, she ran a vast ranch in Arizona. She raised two children, one of whom is Jeannette's memorable mother, Rosemary Smith Walls, unforgettably portrayed in The Glass Castle.

Lily survived tornadoes, droughts, floods, the Great Depression, and the most heart-breaking personal tragedy. She bristled at prejudice of all kinds—against women, Native Americans, and anyone else who didn't fit the mold. Rosemary Smith Walls always told Jeannette that she was like her grandmother, and in this true-life novel, Jeannette Walls channels that kindred spirit. <u>Half Broke Horses</u> is Laura Ingalls Wilder for adults.
