
Youth Group

How to Manage the Holidays when Grieving

Since October 31st, we have been hearing, "It's the most wonderful time of the year," sung by Andy Williams as we walk through department stores and shopping malls. Yet, as you listen to the Christmas songs, you feel anything but joy to the world. You are grieving and your emotions are completely normal. Since we cannot simply cancel Thanksgiving and Christmas, how can we better manage our emotions this season? Here are some Hints for the Holidays:

For Yourself --

- Pay attention to yourself: The holidays are an especially busy time of year, so listen when your body or emotions tell you that you are tired and need a break from holiday preparations. Be sure to let your friends and family members know what you are up for and what they can do to support you.
- Remember "You don't have to": If you find certain traditions painful this year, do not do them. Be careful not to throw out all your traditions, but do not be afraid to let go of some either. You can always pick them up again later with new meaning or start a new tradition.
- Tears: Be prepared that the holiday may be an especially emotional time and give yourself permission to continue grieving. Each family member has their own unique grief journey and may have different needs related to celebrating the holidays. No one way is right or wrong. Do not be surprised by tears or sadness and do not fight them off. Instead, carry tissues.
- Be Flexible: Give yourself permission to not participate in all the usual festivities if necessary.
- Healthy Expectations: Set realistic ones. Remind yourself that this year is different. Decide if you want to claim all the "usual" responsibilities from previous years and be willing to receive help when others offer.

For Others

- Honesty: Let others know that you enjoy hearing your loved one's name.
- Togetherness or Not: Recognize your need for community; however, if you are feeling pressured to participate in more than you are comfortable with, simply say, "No, thank you."
- Give of Yourself: Volunteer to help others through your church or a charity. Invite someone who is alone during the
 holiday to join you and your family for a meal or a concert. Make a donation to a favorite cause in memory of your
 loved one.

Other Suggestions

- Start a new family ritual. Go for a walk to look at holiday lights, light a special candle in memory of your loved one, set a place at the table for your loved one and share memories.
- Try to avoid "cancelling" the holidays despite the temptation. It is okay to avoid some circumstances that you do not feel ready to handle, but total isolation is unhealthy. Allow yourself some time for solitude, remembering, and grieving, but balance it with planned activities with others.
- Create a memory box. You can fill it with photos of your loved one or written memory notes from family members and friends. Children can include drawings in the box.
- Make a decorative guilt.
- Put a bouquet of flowers on your holiday table in memory of your loved one.
- Honor your loved one in a way that feels comfortable to you. It is usually better to acknowledge your loss than to
 pretend that nothing has changed. Learn to be conscious of the moment. Practice being fully present where joy
 resides. Savor moments of delight even amidst grief.

We hope to be nourished and refreshed to serve Christ and his church.


