

A TREASURER'S REPORT FROM DUKE DALE

As 2020 draws to a close I pray that this message finds you well and that you and your loved ones are filled with the love of Christ during this Christmas season. Thanks to everyone's generosity, our Church's finances are in good shape. Through November we had collected \$340,000 of the \$345,000 budgeted goal for the entire year, which means that by the end of the year we will have collected enough to exceed our goal. Additionally, expenses are expected to come in under budget due primarily to the associate minister's position having not yet been filled combined with reduced spending in other areas due to COVID. BACC's balance sheet remains strong and the Church is in a good position to make it through to the time when we can all be vaccinated and once again feel comfortable meeting in person to enjoy one another's fellowship. Until that time, let's keep each other in our prayers and continue to extend as much love, compassion and understanding as we can to one another and to those we meet. God bless you.

A JANUARY MESSAGE FROM OUR FRIEND CHARLES

Christmas is all over. We enjoyed the exciting buildup all through the month of December. Now that Christmas Day is over, it is all gone. But is it? Where did it go? What now? The Gospel of Luke gives us some ideas, as does the Old Testament.

When the angel, and the heavenly host, announced to the shepherds the arrival of the baby Jesus, the shepherds immediately went to Bethlehem to see for themselves. On their way back to their flocks, they told everyone they met of the angel's announcement. We should tell others also.

When Mary and Joseph brought the new-born baby Jesus to the temple for his initial religious rites, the just and devout man Simeon immediately recognized him as God's promised one. The blessing he gave foretold much of the future of Jesus: "He will bring glory to the nation of Israel, and a light to the Gentiles." And the prophetess Anna, also in the temple, on seeing the baby Jesus, thanked God for his arrival, and spoke highly of him to all those who were in anticipation of their savior. Simeon and Anna recognized this new-born baby as the long-awaited Messiah, and prophesied of things to come through his ministry. They happily told all they could of his birth, and of his future mission. We should tell others also.

In Jesus' parting words to his disciples, he told them to go and make disciples of all nations, based on all that he had taught them; and that God would give them the words to say at these times. We should tell others also.

In the Old Testament book of Deuteronomy (*Chapter 6*), after Moses had reviewed the Ten Commandments with the Israelites, he instructed them always to keep God's Words foremost in their minds: "You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, when you walk by the way, when you lie down, and when you rise up. 8 You shall bind them as a sign on your hand, and they shall be as frontlets between your eyes. 9 You shall write them on the doorposts of your house and on your gates." Jesus told us that he came, not to abolish the Law, but to fulfil it. So we are instructed always to be mindful of God's Words, and mention them often to our families, and to others we meet. This a habit we are instructed to form.

Now that Christmas "Day" has come and gone, we (us spiritually minded church goers) are still aware of the purpose, and the meaning, of Christmas. But many members of the general population are not aware of the purpose and meaning of Christmas. They recognize only the secular and popular elements of the season. For them, when Christmas Day is over, it really is over for another year. For us spiritually minded church goers, Christmas is not over at the close of Christmas Day. In our hearts and in our minds Christmas continues all year, as we realize and understand the purposes and reasons in Jesus' teachings. Our Lord has instructed us to share this good news with others at every opportunity. If we do this, our Christmas will last all year, until the next Christmas season.


